Presidents Report to the Annual General Meeting October 2024

The East Gippsland Art Gallery Board of Management is pleased to present their annual report to you the members of the East Gippsland Art Gallery Inc.

This past financial year has been another success for the operations of the Gallery.

Key deliverables of the Gallery during the past financial year were as follows:

- The Gallery displayed 24 exhibitions.
- Fifty-Two (52) Kids/Youth workshops were held throughout the year involving a total of 869 participants. The educational aspect of the Gallery is fundamental to our core values. In recognition of this we employed Areka Brown as our Arts Learning Coordinator to manage this important task.
- The Arts Therapy program continued to deliver tangible benefits to a broad range of the community throughout East Gippsland. Last year the Gallery employed an Arts Therapist, Kate Butler, to further enhance the program.

As you will hear later our financial position remains robust with \$239,305 cash in hand on June 30, 2024. During the last financial year our recurrent operating funding was as follows:

- 1. EGSC \$143,879
- 2. Creative Victoria \$100,000

We are extremely grateful for this ongoing base line financial support by EGSC and Creative Victoria as well as the non-recurring ad hoc support of the gallery.

Our renewed focus on recruitment continued with the 2023 - 24 membership at 158.

Our Shire Councillors have actively supported the Gallery by attending the opening of exhibitions as well as making themselves available to assist the Gallery where necessary with operational issues. We thank them for this. Additionally, The President and The Director made a presentation on the operation and aspirations of the Gallery to a full sitting of Councillors.



Our volunteers continued to staff the gallery on weekends, assisting in staging exhibitions and other sundry tasks. The Gallery is hugely dependent on our volunteer base and without their generous and selfless support our operations would be severely curtailed. To ensure that our focus on our volunteers is maintained the Gallery has instituted a Volunteer Coordinator position. Wendy Reeve has stepped up to fill this position and we are grateful for her contribution.

Our Director, Crystal and her staff have continued to provide ongoing stellar performance in meeting the many and varied challenges confronting the gallery in the last financial year. Crystal has established an extensive network of artists, educators, community leaders, important stakeholders, and key government agencies. As a consequence, she has enhanced the standing of the East Gippsland Art Gallery across a range of sectors. None of this would be possible of course without the support of her capable and energetic staff. A big thank you to you all.

The Board wishes to express its heartfelt thanks to all who made a contribution to the success of the gallery in the last financial year.

Looking to the future we will be enthusiastically pursuing a number of opportunities and challenges namely:

- Addressing the issue of equipment storage and office space for our staff.
- Fostering the involvement of a younger generation to take on the mantle of Board membership, volunteering, and general involvement in our activities.
- Working collaboratively with the Shire and State government in the pursuit of an arts precinct for Bairnsdale.
- Providing support to artists throughout East Gippsland in helping them develop their skills and promote their artistry.
- Investigate the feasibility of "bringing the art to the people" rather than relying on being totally gallery centric.





Our amazing gallery team includes our Board of Management who govern this organisation in a professional and supportive manner.



Regenerate, RestART, Renew

The East Gippsland Art Gallery facilitates an Arts Therapy Program that's delivered by Arts Therapist Kate Butler to people who were affected by the 2019/2020 bushfires.

After the fires, people in remote rural communities needed local resources to help them come to terms with huge issues, some being the need to express fears and emotions.

Originally funded by Gandel Philanthropy in 2020, we have been lucky to continue this program for four years thanks to financial support from the Public Galleries Association of Victoria through Creative Victoria and more recently by the State Health Department. Thanks to this funding the program will continue to be delivered until June 2025.

Each program runs for six weeks to ensure that trust is built, relationships are made, and a safe space is built over time. Due to Kate's limited time, she has now introduced diaries to assist people after the sessions have finished.

Due to the remarkable feedback from recent participants, I will be searching for funding to continue this much needed program. If you know of any opportunities, please let me know.


Kate's most recent workshops have been delivered in Orbost. Here is some feedback from one of the recent participants from that session:

Exhibition

Southeast NOW

During NAIDOC week, the Gallery curates an exhibition that acknowledges the cultural contribution of Gunnaikurnai people in this region.

Titled Southeast NOW, this annual exhibition is culturally significant and aims to:

- Give First Nations artists a platform to exhibit their artwork.
- Encourage, support, and promote First Peoples artists living in Gippsland.
- Fund an exhibiting artist to facilitate a First Peoples arts education program.
 - Teach audiences about their art as cultural expression.

Southeast NOW is the most significant exhibition in the Gallery's yearly calendar.

In 2022, Southeast NOW exhibited the amazing work of Leann J. Edwards, Alfie Hudson, Alice Ann Pepper, Ronald Edwards Pepper, Chris Mongta, Patricia Pittman, Alan Solomon and Ray Thomas.

Every year, with support and funding from East Gippsland Shire Council, the Gallery employs an exhibiting artist to run workshops for schools and community groups who want to learn about the artist's culture. These workshops have become an essential annual learning tool for Schools and educators across East Gippsland and beyond. Last year, Ray Thomas delivered 26 workshops to 535 students. Additionally, one workshop at the East Bairnsdale Community Hub, 3 Community Workshops and 3 school holiday workshops.

This year's exhibition was a tremendous success with EGSC acquiring one of Alice Ann Pepper's most significant pieces, whilst Simon Gregg from the Gippsland Art Gallery in Sale acquired works by Alfie Hudson and Alan Solomon.

Additionally, Brad Brown's artworks from this year's exhibition are currently on show at the Gippsland Art Gallery as part of their Spring exhibition program. I'm super pleased for him. Simon is trying to persuade the John Leslie Foundation to fund the purchase of one of Brad's pieces for their Gallery collection.

Alfie and Alan's pieces that were acquired are also being exhibited in their Spring exhibition program.

Front of House and Gallery Shop Management

Media and Communications Report 2023/2024 Lisa Roberts

Each year, the East Gippsland Art Gallery continues to grow in activity, and this year is no exception. As the media and communications coordinator, my primary role is to conceptualize and design both print and digital media, while continuously refining and



updating the Gallery's web presence and managing our social media platforms, including Facebook and Instagram.

I showcase the work of exhibiting artists through a dynamic collection of high-quality professional photography and graphic design, ensuring their art is represented in the best possible light. Additionally, I oversee the creation of signage for exhibitions and within the gallery space.

My responsibilities also include writing media releases and providing professional photos for local and broader print media. Over the past year, my efforts have led to an average of two media stories per month, along with accompanying photographs, being featured in the *Bairnsdale Advertiser*.

To further promote the Gallery and its exhibitions, I collaborate and provide copy to a range of third-party online platforms such as Visit Victoria, Regional Arts Victoria, and the Public Galleries Association of Victoria.

Visitation to the Gallery website and social media accounts continues to grow.

In the past year, the Gallery website had 19,6793 site visits – an increase of 23% from the previous year. The most popular page is the HOME page, and then the EXHIBITIONS page.

Facebook visitation is up 30% from the same period last year with a reach of 149,346. We currently have 3,800 (organic) followers with 388 new followers, an increase of 6% from the previous period.

Instagram reach has increased 39% with a reach of 15,812 and 2,800 (organic) followers

The EGAG WRAP small artwork prize is an impressive \$8000 first prize and continues to grow in popularity, with many artist returning. I'm actively promoting this outstanding opportunity to artists, within our region and beyond.

Arts Education

Over the last 12 months I have delivered a broad range of education programs to the East Gippsland community.

Over the past year, I have delivered a range of educational programs to the East Gippsland community. These initiatives have successfully engaged a diverse cross-section of our population including collaboration with local disability support groups. The educational outreach efforts have encompassed the following:

- 13 general workshops for children
- 5 specialised workshops conducted at the East Bairnsdale Hub
- 3 workshops tailored for adult participants
- 8 workshops tailored for disability service providers
- 1 dedicated workshop for Hope Centre residents




It is important that the Gallery education program provide opportunities for adults to learn about different mediums and meet with likeminded people.

For adults seeking inspiration and connection, in 2023/24 we offered workshops, and artist talks that ignited imaginations and fostered meaningful interactions.





Children and Youth Engagement

Our commitment to nurturing young minds and sparking artistic passion shone through as we delivered 52 free workshops to 869 children and youth from 15 Schools.



NGV for Kids

The Gallery hosts and delivers the National Gallery of Victoria's Kids on Tour program. This program is designed to engage and offer children visual art workshops that relate to the exhibitions held at the NGV. It is for children and families who can't or don't get the opportunity to visit the NGV and participate in their on-sight education program.







Youth Engagement

The Gallery team are aware of the massive need for youth-based arts education in East Gippsland.

So with support from Regional Arts Victoria we worked with Gippsland East Local Learning and Employment Network (GELLEN) to deliver a painting workshop run by artist Nadine Lineham. This workshop had positive outcomes, with one student applying to study Fine Art next year at university.




Over the last financial year volunteers collectively worked approximately **428 hours**, contributing the equivalent of \$15,000 to the running of the Gallery.




2023/24 Income \$370,919

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To The Members of East Gippsland Art Gallery Inc.

We have audited the accompanying financial report, a special purpose financial report, of East Gippsland Art Gallery Inc, comprising the Statement of Financial Position and Statement of Comprehensive Income all as at 30 June 2024.

Committee's Responsibility for The Financial Report

The Committee of the Association is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report and have determined the accounting policies are appropriate to the needs of the members and met all relevant reporting requirements. The committee's responsibilities also include establishing and maintaining internal controls relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report that is free from material misstatement, due either to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial report based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Those standards require that we comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report is free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial report.
