Our amazing gallery team includes our Board of Management who govern this organisation in a professional and supportive manner.





Regenerate, RestART, Renew – Art Therapy

The **East Gippsland Art Gallery** recently concluded its **Arts Therapy Program**, a five-year initiative delivered by Arts Therapist **Kate Butler** to support people affected by the 2019/2020 bushfires.

In the aftermath of the fires, many in remote communities needed local, accessible ways to process their experiences and emotions. This program provided a vital outlet for creative expression and emotional recovery through art.

Originally funded by **Gandel Philanthropy** in 2020, the program was able to continue for four more years thanks to the generous support of the **Public Galleries Association of Victoria** through **Creative Victoria**, and more recently, the **State Health Department**. The program has also been supported by Orbost Regional Health.


Each six-week program was designed to build trust, foster connection, and create a safe, supportive space for participants. Over the years, the response was overwhelmingly positive, with many participants sharing how profoundly the sessions helped their recovery and wellbeing.

While there is still strong interest in continuing the program, we were unsuccessful with funding applications, so financially we are not currently in a position to do so. I will continue to look for funding opportunities, and I hope that we may be able to deliver it again in the future.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to the dedicated Arts Therapists who made this project possible — Andrea Farley, Brittany White, and Kate Butler. Their care, professionalism, and passion have made a lasting difference in many people's lives.

Kate's most recent sessions were delivered in Orbost, and here is some feedback from two participants from that group of workshops:

Titled South East NOW, this annual exhibition is culturally significant and aims to:

- Give First Nations artists a platform to exhibit their artwork.
- Encourage, support, and promote First Peoples artists living in Gippsland.
- Fund an exhibiting artist to facilitate a First Peoples arts education program.
 - Teach audiences about art as cultural expression.

Every year, with support and funding from East Gippsland Shire Council, the Gallery employs an exhibiting artist to run workshops for schools and community groups who want to learn

about the artist's culture. These workshops have become an essential annual learning tool for Schools and educators across East Gippsland and beyond. This year, Ray Thomas delivered 22 workshops to 380 students. Additionally, one workshop at the East Bairnsdale Community Hub, and 4 Community Workshops.

For the first time, Gunaikurnai Land and Waters Aboriginal Corporation (GLaWAC) exhibited an iteration of Southeast NOW 2025 in their exhibition space. It ran at the same time as ours, allowing us to send visitors their way and vice versa. Sidney Murray looked after the GLaWAC exhibition space, and it was wonderful to be working on this together. I learned a lot from Sidney, and I believe she learned aspects of organising an exhibition from us.

The Gallery team and I assisted with all aspects of their exhibition, including curation and hanging. Their exhibition launch was held on Saturday 21st June (the day after ours) and it was a beautiful day.

Exhibition - International Art Textile Biennale 2025

The International Art Textile Biennale is produced and managed by Fibre Arts Australia and seeks to exhibit the best of contemporary art textiles and invites submissions that reflect a wide range of works related to the textile medium. The goal of the exhibition is to include innovative work rooted primarily in textile.

Launched at the gallery, this contemporary textile prize received 270 entries from 167 artists from 25 counties from which 36 finalists were exhibited. Visitation to the Gallery exceeded 1,100, and included visitors from across the State.

Since the official launch the Biennale has been touring to Galleries around Australia and will continue to do so for another 12 months.

Michael Beazer Works on Paper Prize

The Michael Beazer Works on Paper Prize celebrated excellence and innovation in works on paper, showcasing the diverse skills and creativity of contemporary artists. It was open to emerging and established artists. Entries highlighted the richness of drawing, printmaking, and mixed-media paper-based practices.

Michael Beazer has for many years been a great friend and supporter of the Gallery. A much respected art collector and former Gallery owner, Michael approached me several years ago with a proposal to raise the profile of the East Gippsland Art Gallery and whilst doing so, add to a newly formed permanent collection. His generous proposal was to sponsor an acquisitive works on paper prize. A biannual exhibition that in this it's first year, attracted 133 entries from across the country. I am incredibly grateful to Michael and Margaret for giving us the opportunity to host this prize.

Education Program

Threatened Species School Program

The Threatened Species School Program helped students learn about the unique wildlife of East Gippsland through art. Each student painted a garden stake shaped like a threatened species, which was then displayed in the Bairnsdale Main Street Gardens or at their school during special events. The program encouraged creativity, learning, and a sense of care for the environment. Students explored the importance of conservation and learned how they can help protect local threatened species for the future.

EGAG WRAP 2024 - Small Artwork Prize

In its seventh year, the EGAG WRAP Small Artwork Prize continued to grow, attracting 297 entries from artists across Australia. The exhibition is a much-anticipated event on the Gallery's calendar, offering artists an accessible platform to exhibit and sell their art.

One of the unique aspects of EGAG WRAP is its commitment to supporting artists — the Gallery takes no commission on sales, ensuring that 100% of proceeds go directly back to the creators. The exhibition operates as a "buy-off-the-wall" show, encouraging visitors to take home their chosen artworks immediately or leave them on display for others to enjoy.

Inclusivity remains at the heart of this exhibition. While a small entry fee applies to the majority of participants, the Gallery offers free entry to artists under 25 and to First Nations artists, ensuring that everyone — from emerging young creatives to established practitioners — has the opportunity to take part.



For adults seeking inspiration and connection, in 2024/25 we offered workshops, and artist talks that ignited imaginations and fostered meaningful interactions.









$Children\, and\, Youth\, Engagement$

Our commitment to nurturing young minds and sparking artistic passion shone through as we delivered 54 free workshops to 791 children and youth.

A key focus of our education program this year was school incursions. With tight school budgets and rising transport costs, our Arts Learning Coordinator delivered 26 workshops directly to schools across East Gippsland — reaching as far as Mallacoota





NGV for Kids

The Gallery hosts and delivers the National Gallery of Victoria's Kids on Tour program. This program is designed to engage and offer children visual art workshops that relate to the exhibitions held at the NGV. It is for children and families who can't or don't get the opportunity to visit the NGV and participate in their on-sight education program.

Youth Engagement

The Gallery team is very aware of the strong need for youth-based arts education in East Gippsland.

After many years working in the visual arts, we've seen the significant gap in arts education opportunities for young people in our region. At present, there is no post-secondary school arts education available anywhere in Gippsland.

Although this has been the case for some time—and while we've offered short workshops for young people—we've reached a point where we believe more needs to be done. It's time to create something lasting: an arts education program that is practical, accessible, and built around the needs of local students.

Over the past 18 months, we've been developing a proposal to establish a **Youth Arts Education Program** in Bairnsdale. So far, we've raised \$14,776 in private support and received a commitment of \$38,000 from the Gippsland Community Foundation. We still have some additional funds to raise to get the program underway.


We have schools on board and students eager to participate, and we're aiming to begin delivering the program at the start of the next school term.





Financially Supporting East Gippsland Artists

Supporting East Gippsland artists through artwork sales is a key part of our role. In the last financial year, shop and exhibition sales totalled \$94,653, with \$74,386 paid directly to local artists — a fantastic result showcasing the talent of East Gippsland artisans.

Media and Communications Report 2024/2025 Lisa Roberts

Each year, East Gippsland Art Gallery continues to grow in activity, and this year is no exception. As the media and communications coordinator, my primary role is to design print and digital media, while maintaining and updating the Gallery's website and managing our social media platforms, including Facebook and Instagram.

I showcase the work of exhibiting artists through a dynamic collection of high-quality professional photography and graphic design, ensuring exhibiting artists are represented in the best possible light. Additionally, I create signage for exhibitions and within the Gallery space.

Throughout the year, I have written media releases and provided photography for local and regional publications, resulting in consistent coverage—typically one to two feature stories per month in the *Bairnsdale Advertiser*.

To further promote the Gallery and its exhibitions, I collaborate with external organisations and contribute promotional content and copy to a range of third-party online platforms such as Visit Victoria, Regional Arts Victoria, and the Public Galleries Association of Victoria.



Visitation to the Gallery website and social media accounts continues to grow.

In the past year, the Gallery website had 17,895 site visits – with 12,388 unique visitors

Arts Education Report 2024/2025 Areka Brown

Working for East Gippsland Art Gallery has given me the opportunity to combine the two great loves of my life together; art and education. 




2024/25 INCOME \$356,168
